
Hey Redeemer!

AUGUST

Last summer, we began intentionally praying Ephesians 3:20-21, asking God to "do far more than we can ask or imagine." This prayer initiative quickly grew beyond words, inspiring new practices throughout our ministry. Leaders were invited to pray at 3:20 pm daily, and we opened prayer rooms at College Gathering and in our offices, inviting students and staff to engage with God throughout the week. Additionally, adult partners were invited to pray before each service, fostering a culture of prayer across generations.

At College Gathering, we introduced intentional moments of silence for reflection after the sermon, encouraging students to sit with God's Word and respond in prayer. Many students have taken this invitation to heart, actively praying with the prayer team during services. This integration of prayer and scripture is helping students connect more deeply with God, moving from listening to His Word to living it out in action.

We have also renewed our focus on outreach and evangelism. Gospel Communities now dedicate one week each month to outreach, and we have returned to campus on Tuesdays to invite students to College Gathering with coffee, donuts, and flyers in the free speech area.

This past year, we have emphasized three simple but powerful priorities: prayer, outreach, and engagement with scripture. By focusing on these, we are seeing our ministry grow in depth and impact, equipping students not only to encounter God but to actively share His love with those around them.

We had been coming to Redeemer for quite awhile before we got involved with a GC. We were a couple years removed from our most difficult season of marriage, and even though there had been a lot of healing in that time, there was scar tissue and residual pain we knew hadn't been properly addressed. Not for lack of trying, but trying to deal with it alone felt like spinning our wheels—conversations went to the same dead ends out of reflex. ReEngage gave us the space to talk openly with other couples who were displaying the same commitment by showing up, and the accountability of talking with each other in front of some of the quickest friends we've ever made.

Re|engage is a discipleship-based enrichment for every marriage – the healthy, the struggling, and the broken. In its third year at Redeemer, **44 couples** had a safe place to move toward oneness through small groups, teaching, and hearing stories of hope.

There were so many aspects that stand out—the "homework" that created space for personal repentance and then rich conversation with my spouse. The relationships in our group as we all, though each in different marital seasons, had a common ground of wanting more for our marriage. Hearing the testimonies of leaders as they let us in on their darkest days and how God got them through it. Each week we were left thinking, "We don't have to just cruise through marriage. We get to choose to have a thriving relationship." ReEngage taught us the building blocks of how that could be done. ReEngage has brought us closer by teaching us that each relationship comes with baggage and sin (we're broken people after all!) and therefore a deep need of humility and forgiveness. Whatever struggle you might be experiencing in your relationship, you're not alone. Opening up with other couples weekly was such a blessing and reinstated the need for community that spurs on our unity in marriage.

The other day I was in a village sitting in a park with men who I had just met. One of them asked, "How's life? Have you lived?" I responded "How does someone know if they've lived?" He said "I don't know, you tell me. I asked you the question." I then told him that I have lived because I know the purpose of my life and have been able to live it out: to glorify God for the free gift of grace he's given us through the death and resurrection from the dead. The whole group just stared at me before one asked what I meant by that. I was then able to share the full truth with all of the men there. Starting with sin, God in the Old Testament and his covenant with his people, then explaining the sacrificial process for the Israelites, and finally how Christ is the fulfillment of what so many prophets spoke of: a savior who has once and for all taken our sin and made us righteous by faith through him because he was the perfect sacrifice. The conversation flowed on from there with some reading of passages which I was referring to and answering different questions. Two men from the group asked if we could discuss it further on a later date, and one has followed up since then and we've continued to look at the scripture and talk through its legitimacy. I am thankful that a group of men heard the truth for the first time that night, and I pray God waters the seed which was scattered. - Guthrie, Redeemer Goer



After two years of investment in a local church in in Southeast Asia, the leaders have opened the doors for us to invest in two house groups that meet weekly in as much capacity as possible. We are now attending with them, training weekly with these two groups of 10-15 people, and they are responding in great faith to God's vision for them to be used for the expanse of His glory. At one of these house groups last week, there was a boy, probably 8-10 years old, who wrote all the verses about abiding from the training on his hands. He forgot his paper, but wanted to remember what the Bible said about abiding. Even this young child was focused and wanted to apply the teaching to his life.




DECEMBER






JANUARY

The Redeemer Institute launched this spring, an exciting new step in equipping our church family for deeper discipleship. Over **135 students of all ages** participated in these eight-week courses—Old Testament Survey 1 and 2, and Christian Doctrine—with many even receiving seminary credit. These classes have created space for people to grow in their understanding of God's Word and strengthen their faith and theology. The Redeemer Institute has already become a place where belief is deepened, questions are welcomed, and disciples are better equipped to follow Jesus in every area of life.



I have never read the Old Testament this fast, but it has helped me to make connections between books that I've never seen before. For example, in the book of Leviticus Moses gives instructions about how a kinsman redeemer is to care for a less fortunate family member. Boaz carries out these instructions in the Book of Ruth when he redeems Naomi and Ruth. There were instructions for everything, and while God's people failed time and time again at carrying them out, they knew the Law in the depths of their souls. I have been forced to ask myself if I know my Bible that well? Maybe most powerfully, I have been reminded these last 8 weeks about the vastness of the God we serve and the importance of approaching Him with holiness. 

MARCH

In high school, I started dabbling in witchcraft—tarot cards and all that stuff—constantly looking for something to tell me I was on the right track, that I was worthy. I was looking for something bigger than myself. When I came to college at Tech, I did a reading on my best friend, and a few nights later, I remember having a dream that God spoke to me. And in the most calm voice, He was like, "You just need to focus on me." And I woke up the next day freaking out. Because at that point, I believed in one higher power whether that was the universe or the spirits or the water—but I think having that dream was like a wake-up call: God is God. Period. Point blank. And His voice, because there was no like, "You're a bad person and you're all these things," but was just like "I love you and you need to focus on me," it was really freaky to experience when all I had been wanting my whole life was for someone to say that—you're loved and you're valuable. After that, I started reading through Hebrews and realized that Jesus knows my pain and understands my pain, but also has walked through pain. More pain than I think anyone on this earth can imagine. That type of love that He had in order to die on the cross for me is so beautiful. I can never repay Him for that. Like I have nothing to give except for just saying, "I love you and I want to praise you and worship you every single day."



So funny enough, I used to race against one of the guys here, Ricky, in high school. At the start of this semester, Ricky was in the lobby of my hall, and they were talking about Redeemer and inviting people on Tuesday nights and giving out hot chocolate. So I was like, "yeah, I'll go." I hadn't really been to church since I got to college. I think I was so low, and in my head, I was like, "I need some kind of redemption." So I started coming, and Johnny hooked me up with a free Bible and was talking to me about the Prodigal Son. That story really resonated because I was telling him about how I used to be. I told him I didn't believe that Jesus would forgive sins that bad, but Johnny told me about that story, how it represents how forgiving Jesus is and how he died for us. I guess it kind of opened my eyes. Baptism is a statement more than anything that you're giving yourself to Jesus. You're dedicating yourself to following His word and continuing down that path. And that's what I want to do. -Trevin

While I grew up Catholic and had a basic understanding of who Jesus was, it was more about being a certain way than having a connection with God and I walked away from the church around middle school. Looking back, I spent most of my life just running from bad feelings and doing anything to feel good or even just numb in the moment. I know now everything I was doing was just making it worse and eventually I hit my lowest point. I felt so empty, like all of who I was had died and I just knew the only place I had left to turn to was God. He was the only option. I believe God was leading me towards Him because there are so many instances leading up to me coming to Redeemer that surely aren't coincidences. For example, my home inspector was listening to the Bible on his phone and when we were casually talking about religion, he mentioned he went to Redeemer and I kept a tab open in my phone for nearly a year. I was so terrified to come to church because of all I was involved in, that I filled out a connect card online and asked to speak to a pastor. I met with Keenan and immediately started crying and I poured out my heart and told him everything I had been doing up to that point. Through all of it, he didn't bat an eye and the very first thing he asked me was if I was safe. That moment brought me so much comfort it's unbelievable to think about because all he knew about me was my wrongs and he chose to care about me. I realized that I wanted that. He connected me with Miss Christy and we started a Bible study together which was the first time that I'd actually read the Bible. At one point, we looked back at all we had read and she asked me what I got from it. I realized I needed to change the way I was living, that God loves me and he cared about me even if I was doing those things, but that's not the life he wants for me. I needed to get to the lowest point of myself to give up control and say: God this is all you, you've kept me safe this whole time, I need you. Without him, I wouldn't have made it out and I don

This year, 62 people participated in Disciple-Making Teams (DMTs), 10-week groups designed to help believers abide in Christ while being equipped with practical tools to make disciples. Among them were three international believers who stepped out in faith to begin spiritual conversations, pray for neighbors, share the Gospel, and invite others to discover Jesus through His Word which led to 931 spiritual conversations and 10 professions of faith. They were able to see God at work as Jesus continues His mission to "seek and save the lost" (Luke 19:10). We believe these habits of actively and expectantly seeking the lost will continue to bear fruit—both here in our city and among the unreached around the world.





45 college seniors sent

45 college seniors were commissioned and sent out from Redeemer to make disciples. While these students are part of the college ministry, it's impossible to see them without thinking of how every member at our church has contributed to their discipleship and sending! These students have led worship, served in Kids and Students, gone on trips, learned to share their faith, practiced generosity, and led GCs because of your investment in them!

I regularly serve at 8:30 service with 4/5th graders and then I attend the 9:45 service. RedeemerKids has the privilege of welcoming in a family at the 11:00 service who have 2 girls with disabilities that shift the way they engage in a classroom setting. It is often simple acts like going into a quieter space or sitting next to them while they individually play, offering affirmation when spoken to. It has been a regular reminder of the Lord's intentionality in how He cares and provides for us and I can evidently see qualities of Jesus like His nearness, gentleness and care in these environments. From the start, I felt a conviction that this trip was about more than just teaching English. I began praying for boldness and confidence from the Lord to guide me in sharing the Gospel, even as the weight of the potential consequences pressed on my heart.

On the third day of class, I turned to write on the board—and there it was: a Bible, sitting on the table. From that day on, the last 45 minutes of class were spent reading Bible stories like Daniel, Jonah, the Samaritan Woman, the Lost Sheep, and the Prodigal Son. The children took turns reading, circling unfamiliar words, and we'd discuss them together before reflecting on the question: "What did you learn about God?" And on the final day, we shared the Gospel using the "3 Circles" illustration and a hands-on activity about God's light. Saying yes to this opportunity felt wild, especially when I arrived and realized the "mission field" before me was six children, but we are praying that they would be vessels in changing the trajectory of Christianity in this country where atheism is the official religion.

On our first-ever family mission trip, we took a group to Guatemala. Kids, teens, parents, and college students served side by side—sharing the Gospel, encouraging local believers, and learning together what it means to be on mission as a family of faith. The trip not only gave us the opportunity to bring the good news of Jesus to communities in Guatemala, but also deepened relationships across generations within Redeemer. We came home with a bigger vision for how God can use whole families, together, to take the gospel to the nations.






We got to share alongside local believers who ranged from pastors, seminary students, and faithful church members. We learned a ton from them on how to engage their culture effectively and we also got to train them in Gospel sharing tools over the week. At the end of the week, one of the local women we went out with told us that she almost didn't come on our trek because previous experiences with short-term trips led her to be convinced that Americans were not passionate Gospel sharers. She said our group changed her perspective and that we challenged her to share even more than she wanted to or was willing to because we were adamant about going to every house in these villages! She walked away feeling excited to share more in the actual city where she lives and invest more time developing other leaders in her church to do the same. This was a huge win! We may never be the most effective Gospel proclaimers when compared to near-culture believers, but we can encourage and empower others as we seek to be obedient to the call to go and make disciples.

FAQs

How are budgets created, approved, and managed?

With direction from the Executive Pastors, each ministry builds its budget from the ground up every year. Directors create plans and goals aligned with our overall vision, evaluating what to continue, start, and stop doing. Our Finance Team (a lay-led advisory team) reviews proposed budgets, providing leadership in budget planning and implementation. Then, the Full Council of Elders reviews and approves the final budget before it is operationalized.

We have rigorous processes to track every dollar in and out of Redeemer, with monthly reporting for each department. Additionally, the Finance Team reviews our monthly financials and provides insight and recommendations throughout the year.

How does Redeemer prepare for the unexpected?

We maintain a balanced level of reserves to manage liquidity in all seasons. At the direction of our Finance Team and in accordance with industry best practices, we maintain cash reserves to cover a minimum of three months of operating expenses. We believe this enables us to allocate resources effectively to accomplish our mission while safeguarding against "rainy day" scenarios. In addition to our minimum reserves, we often build up additional reserves ahead of major planned projects and expenses.

Does Redeemer have any debt?

The south campus land note is \$1.2mm.

Why don't we "pass the plate" for giving at Redeemer?

We believe the best way to facilitate joyful giving (2 Corinthians 9:7, Matthew 6:4) is to make it as easy and secure as possible. We provide opportunities to give as the Lord leads. Anyone can give online at redeemerlubbock.org/give, send checks by mail, place gifts in the secure giving boxes in the worship center, or drop off gifts in person at our offices.
