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Week One ROMANS 8:1-17

CHAPTER 8:1-17

- 1. According to v. 1-2, what has Christ set us free from? What does this mean?
- 2. What does it mean to walk according to the flesh? What does it mean to walk according to the Spirit?
- 3. What are the results of walking according to the flesh compared to walking according to the Spirit (v. 6-7).
- 4. What does it mean that the Spirit of God dwells in believers? What are the implications of that? Is this something that you think about often? Why or why not?
- 5. In what ways do you still feel condemnation for sin? How do you typically respond to this feeling of condemnation?
- 6. As a group, do the Orphans vs. Children exercise on page 5.

Week Two ROMANS 8:18-30

CHAPTER 8:18-32

- 1. How do you typically respond to suffering (anger, despair, suppress and ignore, push through, etc.)?
- 2. How do these verses encourage us to respond to suffering, and where does our hope come from in the midst of suffering?
- 3. "For those who love God all things work together for good." (v. 28). What does this verse mean? What is the "good" that God works together (v. 29)? How is this encouraging?
- 4. Romans 8:30 is called the Golden Chain of Redemption. What do each of these words mean? Predestined. Called. Justified. Glorified. Who is the initiator/actor of those words?
 - a. Which of these four words are most difficult for you to believe? Why?
- 5. The Spirit intercedes for you (v. 26), and how can we as a community intercede and pray for you today?

Week Three ROMANS 8:31-39

CHAPTER 8:31-39

- 1. In what ways do you struggle to believe that "God is for you" (v. 31)?
- 2. How do we know that God is for us? (v. 32).
- 3. In what ways do you hear or feel "charges" or accusations from either yourself or culture around you? (v. 33-34).
- 4. What can separate you from the love of God?
 - a. In what ways do you struggle to believe this?
- 5. Have 4-5 people repeatedly read Romans 8:38-39 out loud. What would change about you if you truly believed today that nothing can separate you from God's love for you?
 - a. Consider committing to memorizing these two verses this week.

Week Four ROMANS 9

CHAPTER 9

- 1. Why does Paul have "great sorrow and unceasing anguish" (vs. 2)?
- 2. If God is love (1 John 4:8), what might it mean that God "hated" Esau (9:13)?
- 3. According to v. 17, what is God's purpose in his sovereign acting? What are some other biblical examples of this?
- 4. What are the "points of stumbling" over the issue of righteousness for us today? In other words, what objections or aversions do we all naturally have that make salvation by faith hard to understand?
- 5. How does Paul answer some of the potential objections to election in (v. 19-24)?
- 6. What is a takeaway or an action step you can take in response to Romans 9?

Week Twe ROMANS 10

CHAPTER 10

- 1. How is someone saved? How does someone become a Christian? (v. 9-13).
- 2. What does it mean to "confess Jesus as Lord"? Why is this a requirement for salvation?
- 3. Why do we need to believe that "God raised him from the dead" to be saved?
- 4. Reflect on Romans 10:20. What are some other biblical examples you can think of that show God revealing himself to people who were not seeking him at all? What examples of God's initiative do you see in your own life?
- 5. If you are a believer, it is because you heard the gospel from someone or multiple people (v. 17). Who did God use in your life to bring you to faith in Jesus? How did you come to faith in Jesus?
- 6. What are the barriers that keep you from sharing your faith with others? Who is one person that we can pray God gives you an opportunity to "preach the good news" to? (v. 15).

Week Six ROMANS 11

CHAPTER 11

- 1. How would you define glory? (v. 36)
- 2. Based on this chapter, what is God's plan for Israel? (v. 1, 12-15)
- 3. How is justification by faith the opposite of pride? (v. 20)
- 4. Why is it important for us to know and believe the truth of Romans 11:29-32?
- 5. How would you describe the tone of v. 33-36? What stands out to you from these verses?
 - a. When you think about the context of all of chapter 11, why do you think he concludes this way?
